



RESOLUTIONS, RECOMMENDATIONS, STATEMENTS ON PUBLIC ISSUES

37th WSCF GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2022

23 June - 01 July

Berlin, Germany

1. DEFINITION OF TERMS

1. A resolution is a statement of concern and commitment on a global issue or social concern that is presented for adoption by the General Assembly. It is binding for the whole Federation and is valid for as long as the issue exists in the world. Once adopted, a resolution becomes a policy of the Federation.
2. A recommendation is a statement of concern and commitment on an issue affecting youth and students and has implications on the programmatic work of the Federation.
3. A public issue proposal is a statement of concern on an issue that manifests gravely around the time the General Assembly is being held. Public Issue statements are appended to the official report of the General Assembly.

2. TERMS OF REFERENCE OF THE SOLUTIONS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND PUBLIC ISSUES COMMITTEE

1. The Resolutions, Recommendations, and Public Issues Committee oversees the proposal process and makes sure that requirements for the submission of proposals are respected.
2. The Resolutions, Recommendations, and Public Issues Committee receives the proposals on the deadline agreed to by the General Assembly.
3. The Committee undertakes a screening of the proposals and ensures that they are delivered in the agreed upon format before they are disseminated to the GA delegates. In this sense, the Committee may make changes to a proposal in the interest of clarity and brevity, in consultation with the proposer.



4. Ideally, and given time constraints, the proposals are translated into the official languages of the Federation.
5. The Committee reports to the General Assembly and presents those resolutions that meet the criteria.

3. REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SUBMISSION OF PROPOSALS FOR RESOLUTIONS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND PUBLIC ISSUE STATEMENTS

1. Each proposal must be proposed by an affiliated movement and endorsed by another affiliated movement.
2. The length of each proposed resolution and recommendation should not exceed 250 words and the public statement, 500 words.
3. Each proposal should explain what the issue is all about, the global context that gives rise to the issue, the impact on youth and students, and the rationale behind the proposal.
4. Each proposal should end with a succinct formulation of the motion that will be deliberated and voted upon by the General Assembly.
