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1. INTRODUCTION OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY

Get up and do not be afraid

This year the Universal Day of Prayer of Students -UDPS- is focusing on one of the main themes that were worked on with student delegates during the 37th General Assembly of the WSCF held in Berlin in 2022: the status of democracy and human rights and its relation with uprising fundamentalisms.

The advancement of conservative movements in their different -political, cultural, religious, and economic- faces maintains a contradictory relationship with the stability of democratic processes. It affects, as an utter phase, the fulfillment of the human rights agenda. On the one hand, we have seen how the fundamentalist narratives have slowly become a more central narrative, and anti-democratic movements have grown in followers, consequently, in parliaments and government offices. On the other hand, a world over(un)informed by digital media content and technological advances has become a less free and anomic world, with segmented audiences needing access to the right to information.

This analysis also correlates with the ambiguous misuse of religious symbols and scriptures, which strengthens a new worldwide wave of Christian conservatism that is opposed to the teachings of Jesus Christ.

From that analysis, the WSCF has been observing that the greater are the advances in technology and digital development, in a context of a hyper-connected society, and the least are the possibilities for communication and interdependence of people that pretend to work in solidarity when it comes to coordinating transformative practice to "stop evil" through new narratives of justice and abundant life. This paradox of a more connected but less informed and communicated world aims to continue to shape people into better consumers and create what we now call a new hegemony of post-truth to the detriment of socio-democratic and cultural hegemonies imposed by western societies after the 90s. This hegemony reinforced the idea of the end of history and a world with no more alternatives than the democratic liberal white and man-led capitalism.

One of the main consequences of this process is and will continue to be the loss of trust in the structures of modernity and the failure of faith once placed in the institutions of liberal democracy - so often criticised by the Federation and many progressive ecumenical organisations - now put into a diversity of liquid narratives that are powerful in convincing people. This can only generate more social control and loss of roots. And, therefore, a new desert and emptiness. Most humanity, particularly the working classes and marginalised people, lose their faith in collective processes the most they are susceptible to being controlled by engaging them in an aspirationally seeking the illusion of belonging to the elites to protect their status quo.

Fundamentalisms are then at the service of the digital age's new forms of corporate capitalism and, therefore, at the service of anti-democratic processes and social, religious and economic narratives that threaten the fulfillment of fundamental rights and people's self-determination.

The WSCF is a space for a critical analysis of the reality from a broad political perspective. It is fundamentally a space for biblical and theological reflection, and an ecumenical and liturgical celebration in favour of life.

This prayer we join as an international Federation and family puts us in communion with each other and with the love and hope that Jesus Christ gives to strengthen us mutually to continue to be a counter-hegemonic movement. Still, Jesus calls us to "get up and don't be afraid".

2. UDPS HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Every year individuals, churches and communities around the world unite to lift up students in prayer on Student Sunday, also known as the Universal Day of Prayer for Students (UDPS). Student Sunday is coordinated by the World Student Christian Federation (WSCF) and has been celebrated since 1898, making it one of the oldest ecumenical days of prayer. It serves as one of the tangible signs of our common life and the connection between students and alumni of the WSCF all around the world. The UDPS was first celebrated on Sunday 13th February 1898 at the second meeting of what was then known as the General Committee of the World Student Christian Federation. The participants of the Federation's then ten-member movements believed intercessory prayer should be a vital ingredient in the life of a worldwide body of Christian students.

As a result, the early leaders of the Federation called on Christian students around the world to join together in February each year for observance of the Universal Day of Prayer for Students. During the world wars when it was impossible to hold the WSCF meetings, the major bond of unity between those separated from one another by the ravages of war was the annual observance of the Day of Prayer for Students. For more than a century students and friends of the WSCF have observed this Day of Prayer as a way to express their common commitment as witnesses of our faith in God and in each other, to the world both inside and outside our academic communities.

The WSCF publishes ecumenical worship services on a theme that relates to the Federation's theme of study for the year or responds to current events and issues of concern to the world's students.

3. PROPOSAL FOR THE 2023 UDPS CELEBRATION

The following suggestions can help developing the celebration. Please, feel free to consider them and/or adapt them according to your contexts and groups.

- Appoint a small committee of interested persons to organize the service and to assign parts to leaders and readers. Try to involve a diverse group of people to prepare for the liturgy.
- Try to organize a good choir to lead the singing. The choir may vary/change the sung parts and select different hymns or songs if desired. Parts to be sung may be spoken if preferred.
- You can also replace the suggested songs in this liturgy to adapt to your local language and customs. Brainstorm creative and symbolic acts in the service that would serve to highlight the theme.
- Give adequate time for the preacher (student, Senior Friend, or clergy) to prepare a short sermon (recommended 7-12 minutes). She, he, they may select other Bible readings for the service as the spirit leads.
- If you wish to add a service of Eucharist together with this prayer service, please do so according to your tradition.
- Organize the collection. This year, devote your collection to help support the work of the Federation.
- Inform churches in different parts of the country and invite them to organize this service in their local congregations or fellowship.

4. BIBLICAL READING

God-Community, God-Family, God-Trinity,

We thank you for this one and diverse community in which we meet and recognize each other as brothers and sisters. You have been, are and will be in our lives now and always. Your kairos is in everything and everyone.

Allow us to recognize your presence as that light that comes to disturb us and guide us. May we recognize You in the joy of praise, in the silence of prayer, in the depth of your Word. Help us to follow You, so that we can think creatively and prophetically about the questions and answers of our time.

Help us to serve You by practicing justice so that your message of hope encourages your people; and your Gospel of freedom becomes more a reality and less a dream to conquer. That just as you called your disciples to accompany you to the mountain, or to the valley, to the sea or to the house, today we can stay by your side wherever we are to bear witness and show the sparkles of your love to those who need it.

The transfiguration (Matthew 17: 1-9)

- 17 Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter, James and John the brother of James, and led them up a high mountain by themselves.
- **2** And he was transfigured before them and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white.
 - **3** Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him.
- **4** Then Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is good for us to be here. If you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah."
- 5 While he was still speaking, a bright cloud covered them, and a voice from the cloud said, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased. Listen to him!"
- 6 When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and where overcome by fear.7 But Jesus came and touched them saying "Get up and do not be afraid."8 When they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus.
- **9** As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus instructed them, "Don't tell anyone what you have seen, until the Son of Man has been raised from the dead."


5. INTERACTIVE REFLECTION

"Get up and do not be afraid."

<u>Summary of text:</u> Jesus goes to a mountain top to pray with Peter, James and John. He shines like the Sun, and speaks with Moses and Elijah. The disciples are terrified to hear the voice of God calling them to listen to Jesus, but Jesus tells them not to fear. They come down from the mountain.

Themes for reflection:

- The call from Christ not to fear supports the WSCF themes of support for human rights and democracy and opposition to fundamentalism.
- God invites us to look at the true essence beyond the surface appearance.
- To reflect on the meaning of the Transfiguration of Christ helps us to see God in our lives and be transformed.
- Be unafraid, faith can transform the world.
- Overcoming fear enables us to join together in the spirit of truth and love and justice.
- Stand up in courage. Faith gives us confidence and ability and vision to confront the powers of the world.
- The Transfiguration symbolises how Christ connects us to the eternal truth of God.
- Taking time together for reflection and learning and prayer energises us to work for change and justice.
- Authentic faith can resonate with people.
- As we confront fear, we must challenge the false religion of fundamentalism.
- Fundamentalism is mistaken in claiming the only truth and denying the validity of other views.
- Such exclusive attitudes remove the Gospel call for liberation.
- · God is revealed in a new way to every one of us.
- God's transforming revelation has to be open to God's revelation in others.
- Ecumenism embraces diverse experience, recognising other cultures with respect.
- Don't deny others through prejudice and fixed structures.
- Allow us to see God's presence in the experience of everyone.
- The Gospel calls us to change the world.
- Fear versus freedom We are called by Christ to overcome fear through faith and love.
- Faith should be based on values of love, freedom, truth and inclusion - seeing possibilities
- Love can overcome obstacles to construct the reign of justice and truth.
- SCMs work to overcome fears of prejudice and difference
- · Faith brings us together in honesty and openness
